At age 25 he was still involved in business and military undertakings. At 51 his life came abruptly to an end, destroyed by an incurable disease contracted while caring for pest-stricken people.

In a span of 25 years this man, who was a noble senator of the Republic of Venice, a man who never wanted to become a priest, was able to serve his country and his church, building for himself a reputation lasting into centuries yet to come.



Aimed at Preventing Juvenile Delinquency, Assisting Boys

With the completion of its third year in Manchester, Operation SOY (Salvation of Youth) will become functional in its first project in the United States with the opening of its first cottage in Allenstown, this September.

Youth Settlement House

A joint meeting of the general men and women's committees for Salvation of Youth was held Thursday night at Sen. Louis Martel's hall on Bridge Street. Representatives from other parts of the state were also present including Mrs. Joseph Garofoll and Mrs. John Amrol, co-chairmen of the Concord women's committee, and Mrs. William Rivers, delegates from that area.

Rev. Lorenzo Netto CRS, director of SOY, gave a financial report. To date the project has received well over \$70,000 in cash and materials. Father Netto sald that is humbly

grateful to New Hampshire citizens of all faiths who have rallied to the support of this non-sectarian project to benefit the youth of this area.

He also read a letter received by Ben Fish, a finance committee member, from a 12-year-old boy in Chester, who sent a donation representing his allowance for two weeks.

The letter said: "I have been reading the brochure about the operation of the SOY, which you mailed to my dad. I realize that there are boys who are not as fortunate as I am. Therefore, I hope that my small donation of \$5 will help sponsor the SOY movement. Sincerely, James Turner."







A home is a place where love dwells. It is with that understanding that the people of New Hampshire have rallied enthusiastically to the support of the 10-year "Salvation of Youth" project sponsored by the Somaschan Fathers of the St. Jerome Aemilian Order.

We intend no disparagement of state or county institutions when we point out that they cannot provide the type of love and understanding that the Somaschan Fathers, with the experience of four centuries in the field of needy youth education, can provide to New Hampshire youth found delinquent by the courts. To say nothing of the problems of obtaining trained personnel and providing adequate pay, large institutional structures are physically forbidding. Despite the dedication of most of the people who work in such institutions, they can never provide a real home for wayward youth.

The "Salvation of Youth" project, on the other hand, will result in the construction of cheerful, homelike cottages staffed by personnel who are uniquely qualified and personally dedicated to the rehabilitation of troubled boys—and, perhaps later, girls.

The Somaschan Fathers are vitally concerned with the spiritual aspect of rehabilitation. The project itself is non-sectarian, and the boys will attend churches or their own faith which are located in the community nearest their cottage.

Each cottage will be staffed by a house-mother, a housekeeper and a cook. Direction, supervision, policy, counselling and guidance will be provided by the Somaschan Fathers along with the permanent admission board. The boys will attend chulcic and parochial schools in the communities near the cottages. The Somaschans know from experience that

"moving about in a real community will help the boys meet the challenges of society more successfully."

In addition to Catholic Charities, the courts

In addition to Catholic Charities, the courts, private agencies and families will play a part in recommending admissions to the three cottages currently planned. Father Netto has emphasized that no boy will be rejected because of race, nationality or creed.

Present plans call for construction of the first cottage next year—a settlement house for pre-teenagers—between Manchester and Concord. The year 1965 will see construction of a second cottage between Portsmouth and Hampton. Rounding out the 10-year "Salvation of Youth" project, a center of spirituality will be established in 1967 in Sunapee, a teen workers home between Manchester and Nashua in 1969, and the third settlement cottage in 1972. The latter will be built between Dover and Portsmouth.

The teen workers' home, a boarding house

The teen workers' home, a boarding house and vocational training center, will house teenagers who are unable to find replacement in foster families. If the pre-teen youth cannot find a suitable foster home by the time they are 15, they will be located in the boarding home between Manchester and Nashua.

Prevention, Education, Rehabilitation—These are the three major aspects of the "Salvation of Youth" project.

This newspaper sincerely hopes that "Operation SOY" will continue to receive the outstanding support it has been accorded to date. Saint Jerome was never a priest or religious brother. As a matter of fact, he once was a wealthy patrician, a devil—may care soldier of fortune in his younger days. He fought in the defense of the most Serene Republic of St. Mark of Venice against Germanic invaders and was taken a prisoner. His brother, also a soldier, died of wounds, leaving four young children. Jerome A emillian prayed to the Blessed Virgin. She appeared to him in a vision and aided his escape.

He noted also that plans called for the boys to attend local schools, explaining that by doing so the boy would grow up in a normal environment.

"Our aim in the building of these cottages is to provide an atmosphere of tender-loving care such as that experienced by those children who live normal lives at home. We want to get Away from the stigma that is attached to a boy when he is released from a state institution," Father Netto said.



Civic minded citizens in the Goffstown-Bedford area have risen

Civic minded citizens in the Goffstown-Bedford area have risen to the task of ensuring the future of their communities by actively participating in the Salvation of Youth program (more popularly know as Operations, O, Y). This not a see far an project aims to provide facilities and care for pre-juvenile delinquent children in New Hampshire thereby enabling them to become citizens who are a credit to their community rather than a burden on it. What SOY intends to build
here is not a huge institution
for a crowd of boys. It will be
rather a home for 22 boys with
emphasis on a simple, wholesome home life.

very simple," Rev. Lorenzo
Netto, director, stressed.

ONE-STORY HOME

"So SOY is preparing for them a low, one-story home without infinite stairs to climb, without big and dreadful dormitories. These boys are desper-

tories. These boys are desperately in need of a more homey setting with friendliness, simplicity, and informality."

Designed as a background for living for boys, the first SOY cottage will consist of a large living room, dining room and kitchen with storage facilities. They will be home-like, free from institutional atmosphere.

phere.

Two side wings will contain bedrooms, study and porches. Each wing will accommodate 11 boys. Sleeping space is planned to give as much individuality in arrangement as possible. The study will permit home work to be done with minimum distraction. Porches provide easy access to the out-of-doors as well as serving as play areas in rainy weather. There will be playfields out-side.

There will be playfields outside.

A large, well-lighted basement will provide space for recreation, hobby and craft opportunities. To keep the environment homelike, the director's office, records office and living quarters of house parents will be located on the second foor. The masonry materials to be used in the cottage have been selected for durability, economy and ease of maintenance.

Father Netto noted on the eve of the ground-breaking for this first cottage that the state of New Hampshire has several traditional institutions for child welfare but that no institution is entirely dedicated to the prevention of juvenile delinquency. Operation SOY will fill the gap.

OF ALL AGES

Later there will be boarding houses built elsewhere throughout the Granite State for teenagers to prepare them to get back to a full-scale service in their communities. No boy will be dismissed because of his age. In case the boy's family is incapable of receiving him back, the youngster will be taken in by a foster family. family.

The SOY Board of Admissions will select the children with the help of the Juvenile Court, Catholic Charities, the Industrial School, the State

Court, Catholic Charities, the Industrial School, the State School and other agencies and private families.

As executive director, Father Netto will provide leadership and guidance to the professional staff and to the non-professional personnel in the various branches and activities of the project. of the project.

Living methods in SOY homes are based on the unique experiences of the order and are the legacy of the Somaschans' founder, Jerome Aemilian, a layman who began Operation Salvation of Youth in Italy in the 16th century. Emphasis is on small units to keep linformality, simplicity, and informality, simplicity, and home relations on a personal

Religious services, education-Religious services, educational facilities, medical treatment and similar activities will be provided outside of the SOY home, in the local community, in order to keep the boys in constant touch with reality.

Style of Operation S.O.Y.


The state of New Hampshire has one state school, a probation service and a few other agencies specialized in either psychological or psychiatric treatment of disturbed boys. No agencies are devoted entirely to the prevention of this special disease. This is the main objective of Operation S.O.Y.: all other child welfare agencies will benefit from it.

We do not make use of any big buildings where boys easily become a number. S.O.Y. cottages are built according to a home-like model, to reproduce a home-like life, where each child is treated as a person.

Each S.O.Y. cottage is planned for 20-22 boys aged 9-14, divided in two smaller communities of 10-11, under the care of a housemother.

Religious and educational facilities will not be provided in the S.O.Y. homes, to avoid the easy danger of institutionalization. Boys will go to local churches and local schools. This keeps them constantly in touch with reality.


We do not predetermine any general policy as to the length of the boys residence. This can be determined on the examination of the needs of the single child. We always have in mind that the family is the best environment for care and treatment of children.

TO SERVE TROUBLED CHILDREN

Pine Haven offers foster home care; family counseling services to children and their parents; supervision of neglected children; home life, educational opportunities, and vocational training for youngsters whose own home environment is judged unsuitable and almost certainly conducive to delinquency; residential care and treatment to the first offender whose family seems unable to rear him properly.

Pine Haven provides personalized care for children within a therapeutic group setting. No more than 22 children at a time are accepted. They are under care of housemothers working in a team with the cottage staff and various professional personnel.

The program of Pine Haven does not include care and treatment of mentally disturbed and/or mentally retarded boys.

Religious, educational, medical and psychiatric services are provided outside the institution. Attending local schools and participating in local activities make the boys part of a living community.

The return of children to their own communities is planned by the special Pine Haven Board in cooperation with the referring agency or family.

ADMISSION POLICY

Pine Haven is designated to help boys between the ages of 9 to 12 years.

Children may be committed to this home by the judge of the Juvenile Court, the Probation Department, Catholic Charities, the St. Vincent de Paul Conference, the Salvation Army, by parents or other social agencies.

PERSONAL HISTORY

The S. O. Y. Admissions Board will determine which boys will reside at Pine Haven and benefit by its program of residential care and treatment.

When the Admissions Board gives approval to a request, the boy in question is temporarily accepted and a seven-day period of residence at the cottage is set for him. At the end of this pre-placement, the final decision is made by the special Pine Haven Board as to the acceptability or non-acceptability of the boy.

Each applicant should be introduced to the Executive Director, S. O. Y., with the regular application forms completed.

FINANCIAL CONDITIONS

Pine Haven is supported by contributions, endowment funds, and by fees for services offered to the children.

The charge for board and care amounts to \$100.00, paid monthly, for a yearly total of \$1200.00. Not included in these fees are medical and dental costs. All other ordinary expenses are cared for by Operation S. O. Y.

It is understood that children who really need help shall not be rejected because of inability to meet this financial request. Special arrangements will be made in their behalf.

NEW HAMPSHIRE'S FAIR SHARE

WE NEW HAMPSHIRE people have always been proud of the fact that when things need doing, we like to do them ourselves. And, to the extent that we can manage it, this is a commendable attitude. But I believe it is also wise to have the foresight to realize that there are times when we need a helping hand, and that when this help is available, New Hampshire should take advantage of it.

A STRONG CASE IN point is the Area Redevelopment Program. There have been a lot of words batted around for and against this program, but the plain fact is that many areas of New Hampshire do need help to bring in new industry and create more jobs. The choice is between a lot of hogwash about alleged federal interference and the immediate needs of the people of our State. The choice was an easy one for me: support this program and see to it that New Hampshire gets its Fair Share.

AS IS USUALLY the case, the opponents of the Area Redevelopment Administration have no concrete alternatives. They suggest no other way for Littleton to have received more than \$600,000 to help with a sewage treatment plant and disposal system, directly connected with the reopening of the Saranac Glove Co. and its tannery, with plans to employ 200 people. They suggest no alternative whereby Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital in Hanover would receive \$350,000 for needed expansion of its research and treatment facilities.

IT SERIC TO ME that the value of ARA has been proven in New Hampshire, and it would be sheer folly, since the program is in existence, not to get our fair share in the Granite State. There are several other applications pending here in Washington. I'll leave it to others to criticize the program while I do my utmost to see to it that these applications are approved. I'll leave it to others to worry about some imaginary Federal interference while I worry about new industry and more jobs in New Hampshire.

Father Netto's new assignment was received from the General Curia of the Somaschan Fathers of St. Jerome Aemilian, Rome, and was disclosed by Rt. Rev. Giovanni Oltolina, CRS, provincial superior of the order, who is presently visiting in Manchester.

Father Oltolina announced to the same time that Rev. Ce-sare DeSantis, CRS, STL, D. Litt., superior of the Soma-schan Fathers in New Hamp-shire, will succeed Father Net-to as director of Operation SOY.

It was just a year ago that Father Netto was named direc-tor of SOY, a non-sectarian pi-lot project operating in the field of juvenile delinquency among boys of all faiths, race

among boys of all faiths, races and nationalities in the Gran-ite State.

Father Netto came to Man-chester in 1960, together with the Rev. Titian Marconato CRS, at the invitation of Most Rev. Ernest J. Primeau, STD, to launch the work of the four centuries-old religious order in this country.

Their purposes in coming

Their purpose in coming Father Netto said at the time Father Netto said at the time, was "to repay in another cur-rency — by helping America with its alarming juvenile de-linquency problem — for the way in which Americans helped Italians after World War II."

To prepare for his work here, Father Netto enrolled at St. Anselm College to learn English and, at the same time prepare for a bachelor of arts degree.

Meanwhile, he taught the-ology at St. Anselm College and St. Basil Seminary, Me-thuen, Mass., and, for a time, was instructor in Italian at the Manchester In stitute of Arts

Father Netto rounded out his activities by serving as moderator for the Columbian Squires in Manchester.





